What We Provide:

• Sand and a saucer

What to Bring on Friday 17th October:

• Fresh flowers and leaves

Sourced locally (not purchased) is preferred

Your Child's Goal:

To create a beautiful, symmetrical pattern that covers all the sand. No toys or plastic extras, please.



What We Provide:

· Rocks, paint and varnish

What to Bring on Friday 17th October:

• A small rock (no bigger than your hand) suitable to paint.

Your Child's Goal:

To design and paint a unique "pet rock" and give it a creative name.

Flower Jar Arrangement

What We Provide:

Glitter, Water and Blu-Tack

What to Bring on Friday 17th October:

• Jar with a Lid. The jar must be clean and have a tight-fitting, leak-proof lid.

Your Child's Goal:

To create a beautiful miniature world by arranging flowers and glitter inside the jar. The jar will be filled with water and sealed shut.

Once turned upside down, the glitter should swirl and drift around the flower.
